Dear Shareholders:

As of March 31, 2017, Neiman Opportunities Fund (the "Fund") completed its 1st year since inception. The accompanying annual report covers the most recent fiscal year from April 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017.

The Fund invests primarily in US common stocks of companies of small and mid-size capitalization. These are companies that are usually between \$1.0 billion and \$20.0 billion in market capitalization.

As of the end of the current fiscal year, the Fund had total net assets of approximately \$3.7 million. The Fund had a total return for the fiscal year from April 1, 2016, through March 31, 2017, of 11.30% (load waived) and 4.90% (including the maximum load). During that same time period, the Fund's benchmark S&P 500 Total Return Index had a total return of 17.17%.

Management attributes the Fund's performance, in comparison to that of its benchmark index, to a variety of factors. During the 12-month period covered by this report, management usually held anywhere from 10% to 20% of the Fund's total assets in cash. This was done to allow the Fund to withstand anticipated up and down volatility in the overall stock market, given this was the Fund's first year in existence. The Fund's benchmark index is a fully invested index, and holds no cash for other purposes. As a result of not having to hold cash, the benchmark index enjoyed stronger gains than did the Fund.

In addition, the Fund uses an active investment management style of value investing. Unlike many value portfolio investors, who treat value investing as merely seeking low priced issued, the Fund's management seeks value by selecting stocks whose financial statements and other stock measure statistics display good value for other reasons. Such parameters as price-to-earnings, price-to-book value, and debt-to-equity, when favorable in the opinion of management, provide good measures of a stock's value over the long-term. In the opinion of management, selection of such stocks provide increased downside protection for investors during volatile markets, even though often enjoying slightly reduced returns in the short-term.

After one full year since inception, Fund management feels gratified that the Fund participated in the overall upside growth of the general stock market primarily in the second half of the Fund's fiscal year. At the same time, management took steps to potentially reduce risk on the downside, if excess market volatility should have occurred.

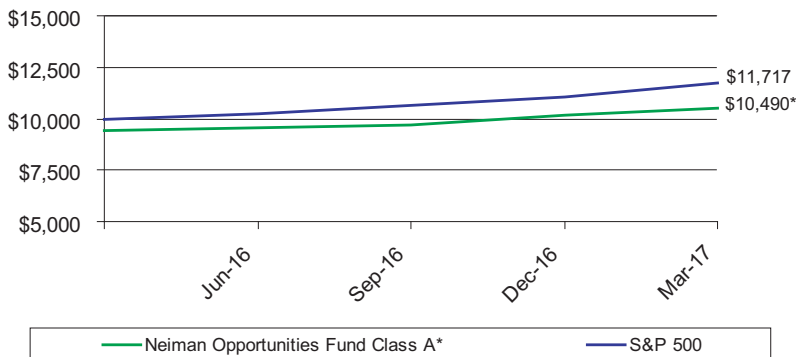

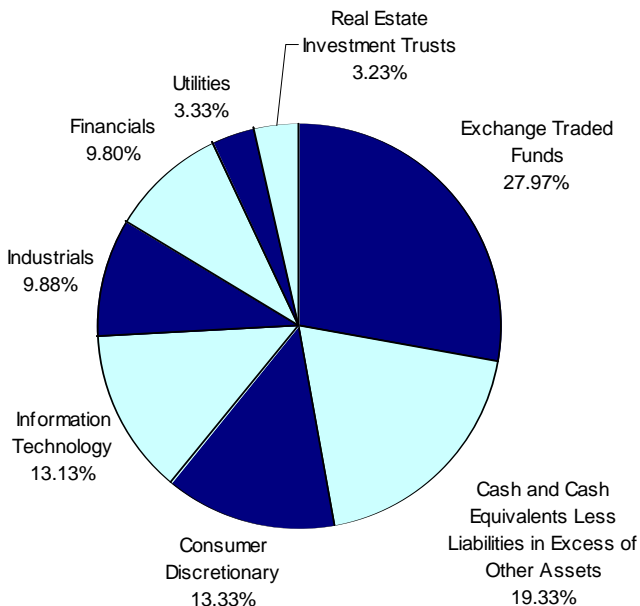

Disclosure of Expenses (Unaudited)

As a shareholder of the Fund, you incur two types of costs: (1) transaction costs, including sales charges (loads) on purchase payments; and (2) ongoing costs, including management fees; distribution and/or service (12b-1) fees; and other Fund expenses. You will be assessed fees for outgoing wire transfers, returned checks, and stop payment orders at prevailing rates charged by Mutual Shareholder Services, LLC, the Fund's transfer agent and IRA accounts will be charged an \$8.00 annual maintenance fee. Additionally, your account will be indirectly charged the expenses of the underlying funds. This Example is intended to help you understand your ongoing costs (in dollars) of investing in the Fund and to compare these costs with the ongoing costs of investing in other mutual funds.

The Example is based on an investment of \$1,000 invested at the beginning of the period and held for the period October 1, 2016 through March 31, 2017.

The first line of the table below provides information about actual account values and actual expenses. You may use the information in this line, together with the amount you invested, to estimate the expenses that you paid over the period. Simply divide your account value by \$1,000 (for example, an \$8,600 account value divided by \$1,000 = 8.6), then multiply the result by the number in the first line under the heading entitled "Expenses Paid During Period" to estimate the expenses you paid on your account during this period.

The second line of the table below provides information about hypothetical account values and hypothetical expenses based on the Fund's actual expense ratio and an assumed rate of return of 5% per year before expenses, which is not the Fund's actual return. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS
NEIMAN OPPORTUNITIES FUND
March 31, 2017

1.) ORGANIZATION

Neiman Opportunities Fund (the "Fund") is a non-diversified series of the Neiman Funds (the "Trust"), an open-end management investment company. The Trust was organized in Ohio as a business trust on January 3, 2003 and may offer shares of beneficial interest in a number of separate series, each series representing a distinct fund with its own investment objectives and policies. As of September 30, 2016, there are four series authorized by the Trust. The Fund (Class A) commenced operations on April 1, 2016. Class A shares are subject to an initial maximum sales charge of 5.75% imposed at the time of purchase. The sales charge declines as the amount purchased increases, in accordance with the Fund's prospectus. The Fund's investment objective is to seek long-term capital appreciation. Neiman Funds Management, LLC is the adviser to the Fund (the "Adviser"). Significant accounting policies of the Fund are presented below:

2.) SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

SECURITY VALUATION

The Fund is an investment company and accordingly follows the investment company accounting and reporting guidance of the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") Accounting Standards Codification Topic 946 Financial Services - Investment Companies. All investments in securities are recorded at their estimated fair value, as described in Note 3.

FEDERAL INCOME TAXES

The Fund's policy is to continue to comply with the requirements of the Internal Revenue Code that are applicable to regulated investment companies and to distribute all of its taxable income to shareholders. Therefore, no federal income tax provision is required. It is the Fund's policy to distribute annually, prior to the end of the calendar year, dividends sufficient to satisfy excise tax requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. This Internal Revenue Code requirement may cause an excess of distributions over the book year-end accumulated income. In addition, it is the Fund's policy to distribute annually, after the end of the fiscal year, any remaining net investment income and net realized capital gains.

The Fund recognizes the tax benefits of certain tax positions only where the position is "more likely than not" to be sustained assuming examination by tax authorities. Management has analyzed the Fund's tax positions, and has concluded that no liability for unrecognized tax benefits should be recorded related to uncertain tax positions taken on returns for its open tax periods. The Fund identifies its major tax jurisdictions as U.S. Federal and State tax authorities; however the Fund is not aware of any tax positions for which it is reasonably possible that the total amounts of unrecognized tax benefits will change materially in the next twelve months. The Fund recognizes interest and penalties, if any, related to unrecognized tax benefits as income tax expense in the Statement of Operations. During the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, the Fund did not incur any interest or penalties.

DISTRIBUTIONS TO SHAREHOLDERS

Distributions to shareholders, which are determined in accordance with income tax regulations, are recorded on the ex-dividend date. The treatment for financial reporting purposes of distributions made to shareholders during the year from net investment income or net realized capital gains may differ from their ultimate treatment for federal income tax purposes. These differences are caused primarily by differences in the timing of the recognition of certain components of income, expense, or realized capital gain for federal income tax purposes. Where such differences are permanent in nature, they are reclassified in the components of the net assets based on their ultimate characterization for federal income tax purposes. Any such reclassifications will have no effect on net assets, results of operations, or net asset values per share of the Fund.

USE OF ESTIMATES

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States ("GAAP") requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of increases and decreases in net assets from operations during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

OTHER

The Fund records security transactions based on trade date. Dividend income is recognized on the ex-dividend date, and interest income is recognized on an accrual basis. The Fund uses the specific identification method in computing gain or loss on the sale of investment securities. Capital gain distributions from underlying investments are recorded on the ex-date. Long-term

capital gain distributions are recorded as capital gain distributions from investment companies, and short-term capital gain distributions are recorded as dividend income. The Fund may invest in real estate investment trusts ("REITs") that pay distributions to their shareholders based on available funds from operations. It is common for these distributions to exceed the REITs taxable earnings and profits resulting in the excess portion of such distribution to be designated as return of capital. Distributions received from REITs are generally recorded as dividend income and, if necessary, are reclassified annually in accordance with tax information provided by the underlying REITs. Discounts and premiums on securities purchased are amortized over the lives of the respective securities. Withholding taxes on foreign dividends have been provided for in accordance with the Fund's understanding of the applicable country's tax rules and rates.

EXPENSES

Expenses incurred by the Trust that don't relate to a specific fund of the Trust are allocated pro-rata to the funds in the Trust based on the total number of funds in the Trust at the time the expense was incurred or by another appropriate method.

ORGANIZATIONAL & OFFERING EXPENSES

All costs incurred by the Fund in connection with the organization, offering and initial registration of the Fund, principally professional fees, were paid on behalf of the Fund by the Adviser and will not be borne by the Fund.

3.) SECURITIES VALUATIONS

The Fund utilizes various methods to measure the fair value of most of its investments on a recurring basis. GAAP establishes a hierarchy that prioritizes inputs to valuation methods. The three levels of inputs are:

Level 1 - Unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Fund has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs other than quoted prices included in level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These inputs may include quoted prices for the identical instrument on an inactive market, prices for similar instruments, interest rates, prepayment speeds, credit risk, yield curves, default rates and similar data.

Level 3 - Unobservable inputs for the asset or liability, to the extent relevant observable inputs are not available, representing the Fund's own assumptions about the assumptions a market participant would use in valuing the asset or liability, and would be based on the best information available.

The availability of observable inputs can vary from security to security and is affected by a wide variety of factors, including, for example, the type of security, whether the security is new and not yet established in the marketplace, the liquidity of markets, and other characteristics particular to the security. To the extent that valuation is based on models or inputs that are less observable or unobservable in the market, the determination of fair value requires more judgment. Accordingly, the degree of judgment exercised in determining fair value is greatest for instruments categorized in level 3.

The inputs used to measure fair value may fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, for disclosure purposes, the level in the fair value hierarchy within which the fair value measurement falls in its entirety, is determined based on the lowest level input that is significant to the fair value measurement in its entirety.

FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS

A description of the valuation techniques applied to the Fund's major categories of assets and liabilities measured at fair value on a recurring basis follows.

Equity securities (including exchange traded funds and real estate investment trusts). Equity securities generally are valued by using market quotations, but may be valued on the basis of prices furnished by a pricing service when the Adviser believes such prices accurately reflect the fair market value of such securities. Securities that are traded on any stock exchange or on the NASDAQ over-the-counter market are generally valued by the pricing service at the last quoted sale price. Lacking a last sale price, an equity security is generally valued by the pricing service at its last bid price. Generally, if the security is traded in an active market and is valued at the last sale price, the security is categorized as a level 1 security. When market quotations are not readily available, when the Adviser determines that the market quotation or the price provided by the pricing service does not accurately reflect the current market value, or when restricted securities are being valued, such securities are valued as determined in good faith by the Adviser, subject to review of the Board of Trustees (the "Trustees" or the "Board") and are categorized in level 2 or level 3, when appropriate.

Notes to the Financial Statements - continued

Money market funds. Shares of money market funds are valued at net asset value and are classified in level 1 of the fair value hierarchy.

In accordance with the Trust's good faith pricing guidelines, the Adviser is required to consider all appropriate factors relevant to the value of securities for which it has determined other pricing sources are not available or reliable as described above. There is no single standard for determining fair value, since fair value depends upon the circumstances of each individual case. As a general principle, the current fair value of an issue of securities being valued by the Adviser would appear to be the amount which the owner might reasonably expect to receive for them upon their current sale. Methods which are in accordance with this principle may, for example, be based on (i) a multiple of earnings; (ii) a discount from market of a similar freely traded security (including a derivative security or a basket of securities traded on other markets, exchanges or among dealers); or (iii) yield to maturity with respect to debt issues, or a combination of these and other methods.

The Fund did not hold any level 2 or level 3 assets during the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017. There were no transfers into or out of level 1 and level 2 during the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017. It is the Fund's policy to consider transfers into or out of level 1 and level 2 as of the end of the reporting period.

The Fund did not invest in derivative instruments during the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017.

4.) INVESTMENT ADVISORY AGREEMENT

The Trust, on behalf of the Fund, entered into an Investment Advisory Agreement with Neiman Funds Management LLC to serve as the investment adviser of the Fund. Under the terms of the Investment Advisory Agreement, the Adviser manages the investment portfolio of the Fund, subject to policies adopted by the Trust's Trustees. The Adviser, at its own expense and without reimbursement from the Trust, furnishes office space and all necessary office facilities, equipment and executive personnel necessary for managing the assets of the Fund. The Adviser also pays the salaries and fees of all of its officers and employees that serve as officers and trustees of the Trust. For its services, the Adviser receives a fee of 1.00% of the Fund's average daily net assets.

For the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, the Adviser earned management fees totaling \$23,403 before the waiver of management fees and reimbursement of expenses described below. The Adviser has agreed to waive management fees and reimburse expenses, without recoupment, to the extent necessary to maintain total annual operating expenses of the Fund (excluding brokerage fees and commissions, interest and other borrowing expenses, taxes, indirect expenses (such as expenses of other investment companies in which the Fund invests) and extraordinary expenses) at 1.45% of its average daily net assets through July 31, 2017. The fee waiver will automatically terminate on July 31, 2017 unless it is renewed by the Adviser. The Adviser may not terminate the fee waiver or expense reimbursement before July 31, 2017.

For the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, the Adviser waived fees and/or reimbursed expenses totaling \$86,862. The Fund owed the Adviser \$6,727 at March 31, 2017.

Certain officers and directors of the Adviser are also officers and/or Trustees of the Trust.

5.) DISTRIBUTION AND SHAREHOLDER SERVICING PLAN

The Trust, with respect to the Fund, has adopted a plan pursuant to Rule 12b-1 under the 1940 Act (the "Plan") that allows the Fund to pay distribution and other fees ("12b-1 fees") for the sale and distribution of the Fund's shares and for services provided to shareholders by Northern Lights Distributors, LLC (the "Distributor") or the Adviser. The Plan permits the Fund to pay the Distributor and the Adviser 12b-1 fees as compensation for their services and expenses in connection with the distribution of Fund shares. The Distributor must approve all payments made

under the Plan and may pay any or all amounts received under the 12b-1 Plan to other persons, including the Adviser, for any distribution, promotional or shareholder support services. Up to 0.25% of the 12b-1 fee may be used as a shareholder servicing fee. The Class A shares pay an annual 12b-1 fee equal to 0.25% of its average daily net assets. During the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, there were \$5,851 of 12b-1 fees incurred by Class A. As of March 31, 2017, the Fund had an accrued liability of \$2,068 which represents undistributed 12b-1 fees accrued under the Plan and available for payment of qualified expenses under the Plan.

6.) RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, Daniel Neiman, in his role as Chief Compliance Officer of the Fund, earned \$4,000 for his services during the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017. The Fund owed the Chief Compliance Officer \$1,000 at March 31, 2017. Mr. D. Neiman is a control person of the Adviser and the son of Mr. H. Neiman, a control person of the Adviser and President of the Trust.

7.) PURCHASES AND SALES OF SECURITIES

For the period April 1, 2016 (commencement of operations) through March 31, 2017, purchases and sales of investment securities other than U.S. Government obligations and short-term investments aggregated \$4,509,761 and \$1,791,674, respectively. Purchases and sales of U.S. Government obligations aggregated \$0 and \$0, respectively.

8.) CONTROL OWNERSHIP

The beneficial ownership, either directly or indirectly, of more than 25% of the voting securities of a fund creates a presumption of control of the Fund, under Section 2(a)(9) of the Investment Company Act of 1940. As of March 31, 2017, National Financial Services LLC located at 200 Liberty Street, New York, New York, for the benefit of its customers, owned, in the aggregate, 83.36% of the Fund, and therefore may be deemed to control the Fund.

9.) TAX MATTERS

For Federal income tax purposes, the cost of securities owned at March 31, 2017 was \$3,476,189.
